Fundamental concepts of drawing. Emphasis on observational, descriptive and analytical drawing. Practice of drawing skills using common drawing media.

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 110

Development of imagery and expression; abstraction and the use of the human figure as subject

113 **Color and Design**

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6)

Basic elements of two-dimensional design. Principles of organization and the theory and practice of color as a basis for creative solutions for the problems of the artist and designer.

Three-Dimensional Form

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6)

Formal elements of three-dimensional form. Application of the principles of organization as a means for producing creative solutions for the artist and designer. Related practical experience with a variety of materials and processes.

Intermediate Drawing 300

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 111 and STA 113 and STA 114

Observational and imaginative drawing including the human figure. Non-representational drawing. Contemporary drawing systems, concepts, processes.

320 Painting I

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 111 and STA 113 and STA 114

Representational painting of landscape, figure, and still life imagery. Painting concepts, materials, and techniques.

Painting II 325

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 320

Continuation of representational painting, and introduction to non-representational painting and concepts.

340 Ceramics I

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 111 and STA 113 and STA 114

Ceramic processes including handbuilding, glaze formulation, and kiln firing as a means of cultural

Ceramics II 345

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 340

Continued development of ceramic forming and kiln firing techniques including handbuilding, glaze for-mulation, mold making, casting, and wheel throwing for cultural and artistic expression.

350 **Figure Modeling**

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 111 and STA 113 and STA 114

Modeling human and natural forms. The figure as a means of artistic and cultural expression.

351 **Mixed Media and Installation**

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 111 and STA 113 and STA 114

Exploration of artistic expression using mixed media and assemblage techniques. Installation techniques.

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 111 and STA 113 and STA 114

Casting concepts and techniques as a means of artistic and cultural expression.

Construction and Fabrication 355

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 111 and STA 113 and STA 114

Sculptural concepts using methods of construction and fabrication as an approach to artistic and cultural expression.

Graphic Design I: Graphic Form

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 111 and STA 113 and STA 114

Introduction to form analysis and manipulation, through theory, concept and visual tools, to develop clear formal languages. Traditional and digital craft. Development of verbal articulation.

Typography I: Form and Meaning

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 111 and STA 113 and STA 114

Formal and communicative properties of typography. Letterform, font specification, style, meaning, texture, and space. Sequence of analysis from formal aspects, to communicative, to a synthesis of

370 Photography I

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 111 and STA 113 and STA 114

Technical, aesthetic and critical skills in digital black and white photography. Camera-based, with production of well-executed and effectively designed creative black and white photographic prints.

Art, Education and Society 371

Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) P: (HA 120 or HA 150) or completion of Tier I writing requirement

Visual theory, learning theory, and social theory in historical and cultural contexts. Fieldwork and research-based written assignments.

Photography II

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: STA 370

Black and white film and digital photography. Technical, aesthetic and critical skills related to contemporary and historical practice utilizing the view camera and smaller format film and digital cameras, on and off-camera strobe controls. Digital scanning, and manipulation, and darkroom techniques. Production of well-executed and effectively designed creative black and white photographic prints.

Advanced Painting

Fall, Spring. 4(0-8) A student may earn a maximum of 20 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 325

Advanced applications of painting concepts, styles, and techniques. Consideration of the language of contemporary painting.

Relief Printing
Fall, Spring. 4(0-8) A student may earn a maximum of 20 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 300 or STA 320

Theory and practice of relief prints including additive methods. linocut and woodcut for artistic and cultural

432 Lithography

Fall, Spring. 4(0-8) A student may earn a maximum of 20 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 300 or STA 320

Lithographic process as an artistic medium. Techniques of the medium. Preparing the plate or stone, printing, and using tusche, wash and rubbing as a means to creative imagery.

Etching 433

Fall, Spring. 4(0-8) A student may earn a maximum of 20 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 300 or STA 320

Aesthetic principles and techniques such as line etching, soft ground, aquatint, dry point, wax resist, collograph, and monoprints.

440 **Advanced Ceramics**

Fall, Spring. 4(0-8) A student may earn a maximum of 20 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 345

Development of aesthetic and technical skills with particular focus on contemporary issues of content and concept. Opportunity for supervised individual

450 **Advanced Sculpture**

Fall, Spring. 3(2-2) A student may earn a maximum of 21 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: (STA 350 and STA 351) or (STA 350 and STA 354) or (STA 350 and STA 355) or (STA 351 and STA 354) or (STA 351 and STA 355) RB: 300-level sculpture course

Advanced applications of sculpture concepts, styles and techniques. Consideration of the language of contemporary sculpture, with emphasis on individual direction.

460 **Graphic Design II: Visual Communication**

Fall, Spring. 4(0-8) P: STA 360 and STA 365 RB: and one other 400 level graphic design course.

Advance from the analysis of form to the meaning of form. Synthesis of form and content will progress towards cohesive communication systems.

462 Three-Dimensional Design

Spring. 4(0-8) P: STA 360 and STA 365 Development and application of visual communication elements for three-dimensional structures and compound surfaces.

Book Design

Fall. 4(0-8) P: STA 460

Principles of typography and graphic design as applied to the book form.

Corporate Imagery

Fall. 4(0-8) P: STA 460

Design development, hierarchical unification, and application strategies for the graphic identification of organizations and sub-units of organizations.

Time and Motion Design

Fall. 4(0-8) P: STA 360 and STA 365

Time-based design embraces the use of sound and motion for visual communication and personal expression relating to the field of graphic design. Conceptual and formal explorations relating to the moving image such as motion graphic identity systems, stop-motion animation, kinetic typography for film, television and architecture, digital video and sound production for short format.

468 Interactive Web Design

Spring. 4(0-8) P: STA 460 RB: STA 467 Digital interactivity as a tool for visual communication, design and distribution of ideas. Conceptual, formal and typographical explorations relating to web-based activities such as interface design, userinteraction and basic animation. Research, writing, and discussion of current related events using personal blogging tools.

Still Photography 470

Fall, Spring. 4(2-4) P: STA 375
Control of black and white photographic materials through advanced camera and darkroom techniques. View camera principles and use. Print handcoloring and archival processing. Contemporary form and content issues.

Color Photography

Fall, Spring. 4(0-8) P: STA 375

Technical, aesthetic, and critical skills related to contemporary and historical practice in the art of color photography. Utilize digital cameras and image manipulation software to address technical and creative problems in color photography related to personal artistic goals, natural and artificial light source settings, and a range of fine art issues.

474 Studio and Location Lighting

Fall, Spring. 4(0-8) P: STA 375

Technical, aesthetic and critical skills related to contemporary and historical practice in the art of artificial lighting for photography. Utilize digital and film imaging, view camera and medium format cameras. Technical and creative problems in color and black and white photography related to personal artistic goals. Control of artificial light source settings on location and in studio.

Photography Workshop

Fall, Spring. 4(0-8) A student may earn a maximum of 20 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: STA 472 or STA 474

Individualized study, resulting in a portfolio expressing a cohesive creative vision suitable for exhibition and professional presentation. Projects may address contemporary photographic issues in any creative field or format, from digital through antique processes.

481 Art Experiences with Children and Youth

Fall. 5(1-8) P: (STA 371) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open only to juniors or seniors in the Department of Art and Art History with a teacher certification option.

Art teaching in the Saturday Art Program. Emphasis on elementary experiences. Planning and writing art curriculum.

Spring. 5(1-8) P: (STA 371) Completion of Tier I writing requirement. R: Open only to juniors or seniors in the Department of Art and Art History with a teacher certification

Exhibition Practicum

Fall, Spring. 1(1-1) P: Completion of Tier I writing requirement. C: STA 492 concurrent-

Exhibition experience in studio art. Audience delineation. Conceptualization. Use of space. Evaluation.

493 Design Internship

Fall, Spring. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for this course. 499 Interdisciplinary Design: Projects and Contemporary Issues

Fall, Spring. 3(2-2) Interdepartmental with Communication Arts and Sciences. Administered by Studio Art. R: Open to juniors or seniors. Approval of department.

Contemporary issues in the broad survey of visual art design. Critical thinking, ethics, intellectual property, professionalism, team building, and project management. Related team-based interdisciplinary design projects based on a production cycle including problem definition, idea generation, research, project planning, production, evaluation, and distribution.

840 Ceramics

860 Graphic Design

Fall, Spring. 2 to 8 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 40 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to graduate students in Studio Art. Approval of department.

Planning and conceptualizing ideas for visual communication problems that are to be expressed in words and/or pictures. Design of research that will expose a mastery of visual aesthetics and concepts in information design.

891 Special Topics in Art Education

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 3 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Special topics supplementing regular course offerings proposed by faculty on a group study basis for graduate students.

892 Master of Fine Arts Seminar

Fall. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 12 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to Master of Fine Arts students in Studio Art. Approval of department.

Contemporary intellectual issues related to practice in the visual arts. Group critiques of individual scholarly and applied research.

898 Master of Fine Arts Research

Fall, Spring. 1 to 8 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 16 credits in all enrollments for this course. RB: 12 graduate credits in student's studio art discipline. R: Open only to Master of Fine Arts students in Studio Art.

Individual research project in the student's studio art discipline directed by major professor.
