807 Language Teaching Methods

Spring. 3(3-0) R: Open only to graduate students in College of Arts and Letters. SA: ENG 807

Approaches, methods, and materials for teaching foreign and second languages, including the teaching of listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Selection and evaluation of materials, lesson planning, and management of activities and materials.

808 Assessment for Language Teaching and Research

Spring. 3(3-0) RB: LLT 807 R: Open to graduate students in the Second Language Studies major or in the Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages major or approval of department. SA: ENG 808

Classroom diagnostic and achievement assessment. Reliability and validity of language tests. Alternative assessment methods. Standardized and performance-based testing. Program-level assessment. Measuring language proficiency for research.

841 Topics in Second/Foreign Language Learning and Teaching

Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Second Language Studies major or in the Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages major.

Selected topics and issues in second/foreign language learning and teaching.

846 English Structures and Functions

Spring. 3(3-0) R: Only open to master's students in the Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages major. SA: ENG 846

Phonological, morphological, grammatical, lexical, discourse and pragmatic systems of English, including historical origins and social, regional, and gender variations. Application to the teaching of English to speakers of other languages.

850 Language Socialization and Second Language Acquisition

Spring. 3(3-0) RB: LIN 401 and LLT 860 R: Open to graduate students in the Linguistics major or in the Second Language Studies major or in the Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages major or approval of department.

An overview of the main theoretical assumptions that underlie language socialization research and its application to second language acquisition and second language classrooms. Language socialization in a variety of cultural contexts including multilingual communities. Applications to second language literacy. Resistance to second language socialization.

860 Second Language Acquisition

Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) R: Open to graduate students in the Second Language Studies major or in the Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages major or approval of department. SA: LLT 461, ENG 461

Factors in second language learning such as age, motivation, language input and interaction, social influences, the role of the native language, and language universals.

861 Advanced Topics in Second Language Acquisition

Fall. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: LLT 860 or LLT 872 R: Open to graduate students in the Second Language Studies major or approval of department.

Advanced course in second language acquisition. Topics vary based on current topics in the field and faculty interests.

862 Advanced Research in Second Language Acquisition

Spring. 3(3-0) P: LLT 861 R: Approval of department.

Continuation of LLT 861. Professional development seminar in second language acquisition. Research project. Collecting and analyzing data. Preparing projects for conference presentation and publication. Topics vary.

863 Second Language Acquisition of Morphosyntax

Fall. 3(3-0) P: LIN 434 and LLT 860 or approval of department RB: Background in SLA research, some morphosyntax R: Open to graduate students in the Second Language Studies major or approval of department.

Theoretical issues related to second language acquisition. Acquisition of morphosyntax.

864 Second Language Psycholinguistics

Spring. 3(3-0) P: LLT 860 RB: (LLT 861 and LLT 862) and Background in SLA research. R: Approval of department.

Second and foreign language learning from a psycholinguistic perspective. Discussion of major research findings and theories of second and foreign language perception, comprehension, and production.

872 Research Methods for Language Teaching and Foreign/Second Language Learning

Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) P: LLT 860 or approval of department R: Open to graduate students in the Second Language Studies major or in the Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages major.

Concepts and procedures for designing and conducting research in second/foreign language learning and teaching.

873 Quantitative Research in Second Language Studies

Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) P: LLT 872 R: Open to graduate students in the Second Language Studies major or in the Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages major or approval of department.

Statistical principles and techniques with particular application to investigating second language learning and teaching.

874 Qualitative Research in Second Language Studies

Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) P: LLT 872 R: Open to doctoral students in the Second Language Studies major or in the Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages major or approval of department.

Theories, principles, and techniques underlying qualitative research. Applications to investigating second language learning and teaching.

890 Independent Study

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 6 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 8 credits in all enrollments for this course.

Special projects, directed reading, and research arranged by an individual graduate student and a faculty member in areas supplementing regular course offerings.

895 English as a Second Language: Classroom Practices

Fall. 3(3-0) C: LLT 807 concurrently.

Lesson planning, materials development, adapting authentic materials, and microteaching. Classroom management for the teaching of English as a second language.

896 Practicum in Teaching English as a Second Language

Spring. 3(3-1) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course.

Syllabus and lesson plan development for a six-week English as a Second Language course. Team teach in a community setting.

897 Teaching English as a Second Language

Spring. 3(3-0)

Teaching of pedagogical skills and grammar at different proficiency levels.

899 Master's Thesis Research

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 6 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course.

Directed research leading to a master's thesis, used in partial fulfillment of Plan A master's degree requirements.

992B Seminar in English as a Second Language

Fall. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 9 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to doctoral students in the College of Arts and Letters or approval of department. SA: ENG 992B

Contemporary theories and issues relating to learning English as a second language.

999 Doctoral Dissertation Research

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 99 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 99 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Doctoral dissertation research.
