Basic aspects of theatrical design and construction. Theory, process, equipment, materials, skills and

Introduction to Technical Theatre Laboratory

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1(0-2) C: THR 111 concurrently

Intensive experience participating in the production program of the Department of Theatre. Assisting at a beginning level with a scenery crew, costume crew, electrics crew, properties crew or make-up

211 Introduction to Lighting Design

Fall, Spring, Summer. 3(2-2) P: THR 111 and THR 111L C: THR 211L concurrently.

Design and technical aspects regarding the design process and electrical production of stage lighting.

Introduction to Lighting Design Laboratory

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1(0-2) P: THR 111 and THR 111L C: THR 211 concurrently.

Intensive experience participating in the production program of the Department of Theatre. Assisting at a beginning level on the lighting crew, as deck electrician or as a lighting board operator.

212 Introduction to Costume Design and Makeup

Fall, Spring, Summer. 3(2-2) P: THR 111 and THR 111L C: THR 212L concurrently.

Technical aspects of the design and construction of stage costumes and costume history. Materials and techniques related to theatrical makeup.

Introduction to Costume Design and 212L

and THR 111L C: THR 212 concurrently.

Intensive experience participating in the production program of the Department of Theatre. Assisting at a beginning level in costume construction, make up crew, or wardrobe crew.

214 Introduction to Scene Design

Fall, Spring, Summer. 3(2-2) P: THR 111 and THR 111L C: THR 214L concurrently.

Design and technical aspects regarding the design process and production of stage scenery.

Introduction to Scene Design Laboratory

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1(0-2) P: THR 111 and THR 111L C: THR 214 concurrently. Intensive experience participating in the production

program of the Department of Theatre. Assisting at a beginning level in the scenery crew, carpenter or properties run crew.

257 Movement for the Performer

Fall, Spring. 2(0-4) A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for

Intensive practicum in techniques for developing physical and expressive awareness and movement range for the emerging performer.

Independent Study

Fall, Spring. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Special projects arranged by an individual student and a faculty member in areas supplementing regular course offerings.

300 Production

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1(0-2) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department. SA: THR 300B

Assisting with box office, publicity, running crew, costume shop, scene shop, or actor for department

Theatre Practicum - Production Emphasis

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1(0-2) A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for this course. RB: THR 211 and THR 212

Intensive experience participating in the production program of the department. Assisting at an intermediate level such as master carpenter, wardrobe master, master electrician for a departmental production.

Theatre Practicum - Area Emphasis

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1(0-2) A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for this course. RB: THR 211 and THR 212

Intensive experience participating in a departmental production. Assisting as a actor, assistant designer, or charge scenic painter.

Contemporary Acting I

Spring. 3(0-6) P: THR 101 and THR 110 R: Open only to students in the Department of Theatre or approval of department.

Intensive practicum including scene study, rehearsal, and performance of works by twentieth century playwrights.

305 Stage Combat I

Fall. 2(0-4) A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: THR 257 R: Not open to freshmen.

Basic stage combat techniques covered based on a Society of American Fight Directors Skills Proficiency Test in a single weapon.

Acting for the Camera

Fall. 2(0-4) A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: THR 101 R: Not open to freshmen.

Acting techniques for work on camera in many genres.

310 **Acting for Non-Majors**

Fall, Spring. 3(2-2) P: THR 101 R: Not open to students in the Department of Theatre.

Emphasis on vocal interpretation and characterization. Department play attendance required.

312 **Design Media and Techniques**

Spring of even years. 3(2-2) RB: THR 211 or THR 212

Rendering and design techniques for effective costume and scenic design.

Period Research and Resources

Fall. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to students in the Department of Theatre.

Methodology for researching historical customs and artifacts that directors and designers adapt for use in sets, props, costumes, lighting, acting and directing.

314 Stagecraft

Fall. 3(2-2) P: THR 211

Theory and techniques of stagecraft for theatrical production.

315 **Drafting for Theatre**

Spring. 3(2-2) P: THR 211

Methods and development of techniques used in theatrical drafting.

Stage Management

Fall, Spring. 3(2-2) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: THR 111 and THR 111L RB: THR 211 or THR 212 or THR 214

Practices and duties of stage management including principles of organization, scheduling, budgeting, blocking notation, and production management.

Beginning Play DirectingFall, Spring. 3(0-6) P: (THR 101 and THR 110 and THR 111 and THR 111L) and (THR 211 or THR 212 or THR 214)

Intensive study in concepts and techniques of stage directing and directing theories.

350 Plays as Film

Fall of even years. 3(2-2)

Comparison of plays and musicals that are also films, with emphasis on structural changes from the play to film.

Movement for the Actor

Spring. 2(0-4) A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: THR 257

Continued development of the actor's instrument and application of Laban's effort and spatial con-Advanced work with improvisation, alignment, and physical character invention through the introduction of neutral masks.

390 **Special Topics in Theatre and Dance**

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 8 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to students in the Department of Theatre or in the Dance Specialization.

Special topics supplementing regular course offerings proposed by faculty on a group study basis.

401 Contemporary Acting II

Spring. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 9 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: THR 257 and THR 301 and THR 402 R: Open to students in the Department of Theatre.

Intensive practicum including scene study, rehear-sal, and performance of works by twentieth-century American playwrights such as Williams, Miller, O'Neill, Albee, and Odets.

402 Voice Studio

Fall, Spring. 2(0-4) A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: THR 101 RB: THR 301 R: Open to students in the Department of Theatre.

Intensive practicum in advanced techniques for developing physical awareness in voice as an instrument of expression.

403 Voice Studio II

Spring. 2(0-4) A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: THR 402

Extended development of the actor's vocal instrument and application to heightened text including poetry, narrations, speeches, the American Standard dialect, and numerous international accents and dialects.

405 Stage Combat II

Spring. 2(0-4) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: THR 305 R: Not open to fresh-

Advanced stage combat techniques. Students to may earn two Society of American Fight Directors Skills Proficiency actor/combatant certifications after completion.

406 **Classical Acting**

Fall. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: THR 257 and THR 301 and THR 402 and THR 431 R: Open to students in the Department of Theatre.

Experience in classical acting utilizing Greek, Elizabethan, and Restoration texts.

408 Acting: Techniques

Spring. 3(1-4) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: THR 401

Acting skills and techniques, including improvisation and Stanislavskian techniques.

Auditioning Fall. 2(0-4) P: THR 301

Theory and practice of techniques used for production casting in the theatre and elsewhere. Monologues, cold readings, and improvisations. Interview and resume preparation.

411

Stage Lighting Design
Fall, Spring. 3(2-2) A student may earn a
maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for
this course. P: THR 211 and THR 211L

Theory and practice in lighting design and equipment. Application of light to stage production through play analysis, color theory, and the development of lighting plot.

412 Stage Costume Design

Fall, Spring. 3(2-2) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: THR 212 and THR 212L

Creating stage dress through script, color, and fabric analysis. Practical application through rendering draping and fabrication.

413 Stage Make-up

Fall, Spring, Summer. 3(2-2) P: THR 111 and THR 111L or approval of department RB: THR 212 and THR 212L

Theory and application of two-dimensional and three-dimensional make-up for the stage.

414 Stage Scene Design

Fall, Spring. 3(2-2) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: THR 214 and THR 214L

Creating stage scenery through script, color, and architectural analysis. Practical application through rendering and technical drawing.

Scene Painting

Fall of even years. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. RB: THR 211 R: Not open to freshmen.

Techniques in scene painting for drops, scenery units and floor treatment for a variety of theatrical

Audio and Visual Technology

Fall, Spring. 3(2-2) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: THR 211 and THR 211L RB: **THR 411**

Development of theatrical audio and visual technology skills through hands-on application and advanced study. Practical applications in audio workstations, computer programs and hands-on

Theatrical Costume Construction I: Advanced Sewing and Patterning Fall. 3(0-6) P: THR 212

Pattern development, draping, pattern drafting, and advanced construction techniques for the theatrical costuming field.

Theatrical Costume Construction II: Costume Crafts Fall. 3(0-6) P: THR 212

Millinery, armor, jewelry, fabric modification including dying, distressing, silk painting, and batiking, and other craft techniques used in the theatrical costuming field.

Digital Design for Theatre

Spring. 3(2-2) P: THR 211 and THR 212 RB: THR 411 and THR 412 and THR 414

Common software tools for theatrical production designers in costumes, scenery, and lighting

421 **Creative Dramatics**

Fall, Spring. 3(2-2) R: Not open to freshmen or sophomores.

Techniques for developing playmaking, story dramatization and improvisational skills in young people. Emphasis on school, camp and recreational use.

Children's Theatre

Spring of odd years. 3(2-2) R: Not open to freshmen or sophomores.

Development and application of skills for producing traditional or improvised performances for children. Projects may originate with play script and culminate in audience assessment.

History of Theatre to 1850 (W)

Fall of even years. 3(3-0) P: Completion of Tier I writing requirement. RB: IAH 201 R: Not open to freshmen or sophomores.

Theory and practice from mythic and cultic origins to the beginning of stage realism. Emphasis on theatre as an expression of its social and cultural matrix.

History of Theatre since 1850 432

Spring of odd years. 3(3-0) RB: IAH 201 R: Not open to freshmen or sophomores.

Crisis and change in theatre architecture and dramatic forms. Dominance of commercial theatre, the rise of educational theatre, and the impact of high technology.

441 **Advanced Play Directing**

Fall, Spring. 3(2-2) P: THR 341 R: Open to juniors or seniors in the Department of

Advanced directing skills, theories, and techniques applied to the non-realistic play. Works selected from Shakespeare, the musical theatre, and other non-realistic forms used as practicum.

Study Abroad in Theatre

Summer. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department; application required.

Current state of theatre through productions, workshops, tours and classes with theatrical professionals at a chosen destination outside the United States. Field trip required.

481 Study Away in Theatre

Summer. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Approval of department; application required.

Current state of theatre through productions, workshops, tours and classes with theatrical professionals at a chosen destination within the United States. Field trip required.

490 Independent Study

Fall, Spring. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enroll-ments for this course. R: Approval of department.

Special projects arranged by an individual student and a faculty member in areas supplementing regular course offerings.

Senior Seminar Fall. 2(0-4) R: Open to seniors in the Department of Theatre.

Contemporary theatre, dance, and performance theory and practice.

493 Internship in Theatre

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to students in the Department of Theatre. Approval of department.

Supervised work as a theatrical artist in a professional or organizational setting. Required workshop component.

494 **Performance Tour**

Fall, Spring. 3(0-6) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. RB: Cast members of touring production. R: Approval of department.

Rehearsal for and participation in the various departmental touring productions.

801 **Practicum: Acting**

Fall, Spring. 3(2-2) A student may earn a maximum of 18 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Methodologies and principles of varying acting theorists. Application to selected dramatic texts.

802 Stage Voice

Fall. 2(0-4) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Principles and exercises for developing the speaking voice. Application to selected dramatic texts.

803 Acting Theory

Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Theories, processes, techniques, and styles of acting set forth in the writings of prominent performers, teachers and critics.

804 Practicum: Voice

Fall, Spring. 2(0-4) A student may earn a maximum of 12 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Methodologies and principles of varying vocal theorists. Application to selected dramatic texts.

805 Practicum: Movement

Fall, Spring. 2(0-4) A student may earn a maximum of 12 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Methodologies and principles of varying movement theorists. Application to selected dramatic texts.

809 Stage Combat

Spring. 2(1-2) P: THR 450

Safe and effective methods of depicting violence for stage and film. Hand to hand combat such as kicks, punches, and falls. Weapon work with rapier, dagger, broadsword, quarterstaff, foil, axe and shield.

811 Problems in Theatre Design

Spring. 3(2-2) A student may earn a maximum of 15 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Approaches to design problems in costumes, scenery, lighting, architecture, properties, or sound.

812 Modern and Contemporary Theatrical Design

Fall of odd years. 3(3-0) R: Open only to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Scenic design concepts from Appia and Craig to the present.

813 Period Resources and Research

Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Methodology used in researching historical customs and artifacts that actors, directors and designers adapt for use in acting styles, scenery, costumes, props, and directing.

814 Digital Design Media for Theatre

Spring. 3(2-2) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Targeted exploration of common software tools for theatrical production designers in scenery, costumes and lighting.

830 Introduction to Graduate Studies

Fall, Spring. 2 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 3 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Critical thinking methods, research techniques, and scholarly theory and writing. Understanding analytical and evaluative thinking and knowledge creation. Examination and critique of dramatic work.

831 Studies in Theatre History

Fall of odd years, Spring of odd years. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 12 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Selected periods and genres of world theatre history. Theatre as cultural expression and as performance art. Topics vary.

832 Studies in Comparative Theatre and Drama

Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 12 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Comparative study of selected playwrights, developments, movements, and trends in world drama from their beginnings to the present.

833 Contemporary Issues of Theatrical Theory and Criticism

Fall. 3(3-0) R: Open only to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Critical and theoretical texts on drama from the early Greeks to the present.

334 Professional Aspects

Fall, Spring. 2(1-2) R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Preparation for a career as theatre professional or academician.

841 Advanced Directing Practices

Spring of even years. 3(2-2) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Directing theory and practice in contemporary theatre, including research and experimentation.

870 Collaborative Studio in Theatre

Fall, Spring. 3(1-4) A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Creating productions in the areas of directing, acting, scene design, costume design, lighting design, and sound design within a collaborative setting. Practical application through area specified media.

890 Independent Study

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 8 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to graduate students in the Department of Theatre or approval of department.

Special projects, directed reading, and research arranged by an individual graduate student and a faculty member in areas supplementing regular course offerings.

894 Special Projects in Theatre

Fall, Spring. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 10 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to graduate students in the Department of Theatre. Approval of department.

Special projects related to specific assignments in acting, directing, or design in departmentally approved production.

899 Master's Thesis Research

Fall, Spring, Summer. 2 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 4 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open only to graduate students in the Department of Theatre.

Directed research leading to a master's thesis, used in partial fulfillment of Plan A master's degree requirements.
