Theory and practice of invention in writing. Strategies and theories of generating and exploring thought in civic and professional writing contexts.

311 Introduction to Documentary Production

Spring. 3(2-2) Interdepartmental with Film Studies and Journalism and Media and Information. Administered by Media and Information. P: MI 211 R: Open to students in the Documentary Production Minor. SA: TC 233 Introduction to documentary production using accessible and affordable digital technology.

Technical Writing (W) 320

Spring. 3(3-0) P: (WRA 202) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to students in the Department of Forestry or in the Professional Writing Major or approval of department. SA: AL 320

Principles and practices of effective writing in the workplace. Technical, scientific, and electronic-mediated writing. Includes audience and organizational needs, visual rhetoric, information design, electronic publication, ethics, technical style, usability testing, and team writing.

330 Writing Research in Communities and Cultures

Fall. 3(3-0) P: (WRA 202) and completion of Tier I writing requirement RB: ISS 300-level course

Writing and research methods in and with local, global, and online communities and organizations. Topics include methods of field research and textual analysis and the ethics of representation.

Writing in the Public Interest (W) 331

Spring. 3(3-0) P: (WRA 202) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to students in the Department of Forestry or in the Professional Writing major or approval of department. SA: AL 331

Various forms of public writing and rhetoric and their roles in democracy and public culture. Practice in modes of public and civic discourse, including deliberative strategies and a range of public literacies.

341 Nature, Environmental, and Travel Writing

Fall of even years. 3(3-0) Interdepartmental with Fisheries and Wildlife. Administered by Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures. P: Completion of Tier I Writing Requirement R: Open to undergraduate students in the Department of Forestry or in the Professional Writing major or in the Fisheries and Wildlife major or approval of department. SA: AL 341

Writing- and reading-intensive course focusing on nature writing, place-based writing, and travel writing which engage the environmental imagination, shaped by the variety of human relationships with place.

Writing for Publication Workshop 355

Workshop for students developing writing for a variety of print and online publications.

360 Visual Rhetoric

Visual literacy, design, and rhetoric. Effects of visual elements in print and online documents. Intensive writing and design.

Introduction to Grammar and Editing (W) 370 Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) P: (WRA 202) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to students in the Professional Writing Major or approval of department.

Theories, practice, and processes of grammar, style, and rhetorical issues for professional writers.

395 Writing Center Theory and Practice

Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) Interdepartmental with English. Administered by Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures. P: Completion of Tier I Writing Requirement R: Approval of department.

Writing center theory and practice. Consulting practices.

401 Writing and Leadership in the Professions

Summer. 3(3-0) P: Completion of Tier I Writing Requirement

Designed to support the learning of the basics of work-place communication. Focus on core rhetorical skills used across diverse businesses and organizations.

410 Advanced Web Authoring

Spring. 3(3-0) P: (WRA 210) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to students in the Professional Writing major and open to students in the Rhetoric and Writing major or approval of department. SA: AL 410 Developing and maintaining large-scale, interactive

Web sites. Visual design, usability, audio and video integration, ongoing site management, and web accessibility.

411 Collaborative Documentary Design and Production (W)

Spring. 3(2-2) Interdepartmental with Film Studies and Journalism and Media and Information. Administered by Media and Information. P: Completion of Tier I Writing Requirement R: Open to students in the Documentary Production Minor. SA: TC 411

Design and development of documentaries in a team setting using video and audio, still photography, web design, and print media. Participation in a production cycle including idea generation, research, design, production, and distribution.

415 Digital Rhetoric

Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) P: (WRA 202) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to students in the Professional Writing major and open to students in the Rhetoric and Writing major or approval of department. SA: AL 415

Rhetorical, social, political, economic, and ethical dimensions of digital communication, including identity, community, genre, and events. Rhetorical dynamics of communication across digital spaces such as apps, websites, software, and other experiences.

420 Content Strategy

Spring. 3(3-0) P: (WRA 320) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to students in the Professional Writing Major and open to graduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures or in the Professional Writing Major or approval of department.

Applied theory and best practices for content strategy. Understanding the content management lifecycle, aligning content strategy to business goals, assessing communication needs for audiences and participants. Issues in project leadership, management, intellectual property, and organizational communication for creating flexible, dynamic content and content structures.

425 Advanced Multimedia Writing

Spring. 3(3-0) P: (WRA 202 and WRA 225) and completion of Tier I writing requirement RB: Experience with multimedia writing and production.

Professional writing, visual rhetoric, and design theories applied to multimedia projects. Advanced work in writing, directing, critiquing, and producing digital compositions that include multiple media and largescale projects.

453 Grant and Proposal Writing

Fall. 3(3-0) P: (WRA 202) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to students in the Department of Forestry or in the Professional Writing major and open to students in the Rhetoric and Writing major or approval of department. SA: AL 453

Researching and writing grants and proposals for corporations, nonprofit organizations, businesses, and government agencies.

455 Portfolio Seminar

Spring. 3(3-0) P: (WRA 202) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to seniors in the Professional Writing Major and open to seniors in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures.

Workshop for students preparing professional document portfolios in print and digital formats, including application materials for career, graduate study, and professional positions.

460 Advanced Visual Rhetoric and Document Design

Spring. 3(3-0) P: (WRA 202 and WRA 360) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures or in the Experience Architecture Major or approval of department.

Develop and manage document design projects with clients, using iterative and participatory design and research methods. Research, design, project management, and client communication skillsets in visual rhetoric, professional writing, and document design.

471 The Rhetoric of Grammar

Spring. 3(3-0) P: WRA 370 R: Open to students in the Professional Writing Major or approval of department.

Discussion of grammar, style, and language debates, paying special attention to the role of rhetorical context in ideas of grammaticality and appropriateness.

480 Publication Management I

Fall. 3(3-0) P: ((WRA 202 and WRA 370) or approval of department) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to students in the Professional Writing Major or approval of department. SA: WRA 380

Experience in publication processes: creating, designing, editing, and managing periodical, book, or online publications. Copyediting, developmental editing, design and layout, distribution and publicity. Rhetorical approaches to editing. Team processes involved in designing and editing publications. History of publishing.

481 Publication Management II

Spring. 3(3-0) P: (WRA 202 and WRA 370) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to students in the Professional Writing Major. SA: WRA 470

Experience in publication processes: creating, designing, editing, and managing periodical, book, or online publications. Copyediting, developmental editing, design and layout, distribution and publicity. Rhetorical approaches to editing. Team processes involved in designing and editing publications. History of publishing.

482 Information and Interaction Design

Fall of even years. 3(3-0) P: (WRA 210 or WRA 410) and completion of Tier I writing requirement RB: At least one of the following: web design, database design, graphic design, document design. R: Open to undergraduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures or in the Professional Writing Major and open to graduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures or approval of department.

Design of information systems for professional writers. Pitching ideas. Developing information and interfaces. User-centered design lifecycle. Activity analysis, object-oriented modeling, prototyping, and technical specifications, and implementation planning.

490 Independent Study

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 8 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: Completion of Tier I writing requirement. R: Open to students.

Special project, directed reading and research.

491 Special Topics

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 8 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: Completion of Tier I Writing Requirement R: Open to undergraduate students and open to graduate-professional students.

Writing and reading intensive course on special topics in professional writing. Topics vary.

493 Internship in Professional Writing

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: ((WRA 202 and WRA 210 and WRA 260 and WRA 360) or approval of department) and completion of Tier I writing requirement R: Open to students in the Professional Writing major and not open to freshmen or sophomores. Approval of department. SA: AL 493E, WRA 493E, WRA 493D

Supervised work as writers and editors in a corporate, organizational, or publishing setting. Required online assignments.

499 International Research in Professional Writing

Summer. 1 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: (WRA 202 or approval of department) and completion of Tier I writing requirement RB: WRA 330 R: Approval of department.

Supervised research experiences in research in professional writing topics and sites.

805 Rhetoric Theory and History

Fall. 3(3-0) R: Open to graduate students in the College of Arts and Letters or in the College of Communication Arts and Sciences or approval of college. SA: AL 805

Historical perspective on major theories, issues, and topics in rhetoric and writing from classical times to the present.

841 Professional Writing Theory and Research

Spring of odd years. 3(3-0) R: Open to master's students or doctoral students in the Digital Rhetoric and Professional Writing major or in the Rhetoric and Writing major. SA: AL 841

Theory and research informing technical and professional writing practices. Workplace studies, usability research, information design theory, rhetoric of science and technology, research on computer-mediated writing.

848 American Cultural Rhetorics: Theory and Methodology

Spring. 3(3-0) R: Open to graduate students in the College of Arts and Letters or in the College of Communication Arts and Sciences or approval of college. SA: AL 848

Current methodological issues in rhetorical approaches to American cultural rhetorics.

853 Workshop in Rhetoric and Writing

Spring. 3(3-0) R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures.

Directed practice in various forms of academic and professional writing necessary to scholars and teachers in the discipline of rhetoric and writing.

854 Nonfiction Writing Workshop

Spring. 3(3-0) RB: Some experience in writing workshop courses. R: Open to graduate students in the College of Arts and Letters or in the College of Communication Arts and Sciences or in the College of Education. SA: AL 854

Directed practice in writing various forms of nonfiction.

860 Visual Rhetoric Theory for Professional Writers

Spring of even years. 3(3-0) R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures or approval of department. SA: AL 860

Theories of visual rhetoric and document design. Effects of visual elements in print and online documents. Intensive writing, analysis, and production.

870 Research Methodologies in Rhetoric and Composition

Fall. 3(3-0) R: Open to doctoral students in the Rhetoric and Writing major and open to master's students in the Critical Studies in Literacy and Pedagogy major and open to master's students in the Digital Rhetoric and Professional Writing major. SA: AL 870

Survey of rhetoric and composition methodologies and their theoretical bases.

872 Methods of Research in Rhetoric and Writing

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 9 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures. SA: AL 872, ENG 872

Specific methods modules. Practices, concepts and procedures for designing, evaluating, and conducting research in Rhetoric & Writing using specifically designated methods

877 Community Literacy

Spring of even years. 3(3-0) Interdepartmental with Teacher Education. Administered by Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures. R: Open to graduate students or master's students or doctoral students in the College of Education or in the Department of English or in the Professional Writing Major or in the Rhetoric and Writing Major. SA: AL 877

Applied research in a community organization, nonprofit agency, workplace, or school. Theories and designs of service learning pedagogies.

878 Composition Studies: Issues, Theory, and Research

Spring. 3(3-0) R: Open to graduate students in the College of Arts and Letters or in the College of Education or approval of college. SA: ENG 876, AL 878

Issues, research, and theories shaping current work in composition studies. Intersections with studies in literacy, discourse, and critical theory.

882 Contemporary Theories of Rhetoric

Spring of even years. 3(3-0) R: Open to graduate students or master's students or doctoral students in the Department of English or in the Professional Writing Major or in the Rhetoric and Writing Major. SA: AL 882

Modern, postmodern, and contemporary rhetoric theories and their impact on writing and writing instruction. Cultural studies, critical theory, feminist discourse theory, rhetorical ethics, visual rhetoric, digital and media theory.

885 Research Colloquium

Fall. 3(3-0) R: Open to doctoral students in the Rhetoric and Writing major. SA: AL 885 Professional development seminar focused on developing research skills, designing research projects, and preparing publications and conference presentations.

886 Master's Research Colloquium

Fall. 1(1-0) R: Open to master's students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures.

Professional development seminar focused on developing research skills, designing research projects, and preparing publications, conference presentations, and other professional materials unique to master's students.

888 Methods in the Teaching of College-Level Writing Spring. 3(3-0) R: Open to graduate students

Spring. 3(3-0) R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures.

Strategies and methods of teaching college-level writing.

890 Independent Study in Rhetoric and Writing

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 6 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 9 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures or approval of department.

Special projects, directed reading, and research arranged by an individual graduate student and a faculty member in areas supplementing regular course offerings.

891 Special Topics in Rhetoric and Writing

Fall, Spring, Summer. 3(3-0) A student may earn a maximum of 24 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures or approval of department.

Special topics supplementing regular course offerings, proposed by faculty on a group study basis.

893A Internship in Rhetoric and Writing

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 6 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures or approval of department.

Internships in a corporate, organizational, or publishing setting. Supervised graduate practicums, observations, or internships in secondary classrooms or in college writing, literacy, or rhetoric classrooms.

893B Internship in Professional Writing

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 6 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures or approval of department.

Internship in professional writing for master's students.

893D Internship in Literacy and Pedagogy

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 6 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures or approval of department.

Internship in literacy and pedagogy for master's students.

898 Master's Research

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 3 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 3 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to graduate students in the Department of Writing, Rhetoric and American Cultures or approval of department.

Master's research for Plan B students.

899 Master's Thesis Research

Master's thesis for Plan A students.

992 Seminar in Language Literacy and Pedogogy

Teaching English literature, language, and composition.
