500C Constitutional Law I Fall, Spring. 2(2-0) R: Open to students in the

MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 171 A surveys the principles of national powers among

Congress, the President, and the Judiciary.

# 500F Criminal Law

Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 131

A study of the Criminal Justice System with an emphasis on defense counsel and prosecutor, adversary systems, ethics, criminal statutes, inchoate crimes and defenses.

#### 500G Property

Fall, Spring, Summer. 4(4-0) R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 113

A survey of fundamental property law. The topics covered included possessory interests real and personal, findings, bailments, and adverse possession.

# 500M Business Enterprises

Fall, Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 409

This course focuses on agency, partnership, and closely-held corporations.

# 500N Constitutional Law II

Fall, Spring. 4(4-0) R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 172

A study of procedure and substantive due process, equal protection, Bill of Rights, and Freedom of Expression.

### 500P Evidence

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. SA: DCL 220

Study of the principles of evidence under the Anglo-American system of jurisprudence.

### 500Q Professional Responsibility

Fall, Spring, Summer. 3(3-0) R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 260

This course explores the obligations owed by the lawyer, both individually, and as a member of the legal profession.

### 500R Torts I

Fall. 4(4-0) R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 141

This course examines the protection the law affords against interference by others with one's person, property, or intangible interest.

# 500U Topics in Professional Responsibility

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 10 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students in the MSU College of Law. Special topics in law.

### 501A Basic Income Tax A

Fall, Spring. 2(2-0) R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 249 Not open to students with credit in LAW 501B. Basic concepts of federal income taxation.

### 501B Basic Income Tax B

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 5 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 250 Not open to students with credit in LAW 501A or LAW 501K.

An in-depth examination of technical federal income tax issues, including a focus on solving complex tax problems.

# 501D Trusts and Estates

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 210

A survey of practices for transmitting wealth in view of death.

# 501E Secured Transactions

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 240

Process of financing the sale of goods. Article 9 of the Uniform Commercial Code - Secured Transactions focus.

### 501F Sales and Leases

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 530B R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. SA: LAW 501C

Formation and terms, as well as breach, of contracts for sales of goods under Article 2 of the Uniform Commercial Code. Examines Article 2a's provision on leases. Comparisons between Article 2 of the Uniform Commercial Code and the United Nations Convention on the International Sale of Goods.

### 501G Payment Systems

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 530B R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. SA: LAW 501C

Negotiable instruments, bank deposits and collections, funds transfer, and letters of credit under the Uniform Commercial Code.

#### 501J Secured Transactions and Practice

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500E R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 501E.

Examination of the intricacies of a secured transaction under the Revised Article 9 of the Uniform Commercial Code.

# 501K Basic Income Taxation

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 501A or LAW 501B.

Examination of technical federal income tax issues, including a focus on solving complex tax problems.

### 501M Commercial Transactions Survey

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 530B R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 501F or LAW 501G.

Survey of sales of goods and payment systems under the Uniform Commercial Code.

### 502 Accounting for Lawyers

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 508 This course covers basic topics in accounting relevant to a business lawyer's practice.

# 504 Antitrust Law

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 310

The study of how courts apply basic economic principles to business practice in a wide variety of industries.

#### 505A Commercial Arbitration

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 569

Philosophy of conflict between arbitration and dispute resolution.

## 505B Arbitration-Labor

Fall, Spring. 1 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 315

Current thinking of arbitrators interpreting collective bargaining agreements including techniques of opinion writing and advocacy before labor arbitrators. Collective bargaining agreements, whether an issue is subject to arbitration, timelines for filing an arbitration, the burden of proof, quantum of proof, the concept of discipline and just cause, as well as contract interpretation. Participation in mock trials and drafting an arbitration opinion.

### 505C Problem-Solving Approaches to Conflict Resolution

Fall, Spring, Summer. 2 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500A or LAW 500B R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 553

An interactive course covering alternative dispute resolution, negotiations, mediation, agreements to mediate, mediator liability, and professional responsibility.

# 505D Dispute Resolution in the Workplace

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 598

Arbitration of disputes arising out of collective bargaining agreements.

# 505G Arbitration Advocacy

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Survey of commercial arbitration process.

## 505J Online Dispute Resolution

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Analyze online dispute resolution platforms and resolve simulated disputes.

# 506A Bankruptcy

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 322 Not open to students with credit in LAW 506F.

Survey of bankruptcy law, the bankruptcy code, and the creditor/debtor relationship.

# 506E Consumer Bankruptcy

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. SA: LAW 506A Not open to students with credit in I AW 506A

with credit in LAW 5060. State law debt collection methods. Basic principles of federal bankruptcy law. Fundamentals of consumer bankruptcy under Chapters 7 and 13 of the Bankruptcy Code.

# 506F Chapter 11 Reorganization

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. SA: LAW 506C Not open to students with credit in LAW 506A.

In-depth look at reorganization under Chapter 11 of the Bankruptcy Code.

# 506G Advanced Chapter 7 Practicum

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 506E R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Provide assistance to the pro se debtor in chapter 7 bankruptcy cases.

### 506J The Distressed Firm

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 500M R: Open to Law students or law advanced students. Legal, ethical, and management issues facing a firm

in financial or other distress.

507 Business, Securities, and Tax Planning Fall. 0 to 6 credits. P: (LAW 501A or LAW 501B or LAW 501K) and LAW 500M R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 440

Problems of corporations, partnership organization, allocation control, issuance of securities, use of debt, equity finance, and dividends.

# 508A Corporate Counsel Seminar

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500M R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 577

A study of legal issues faced by lawyers with corporate clients on an in-house basis. There will be twelve guests lecturers.

### 508B Corporate Finance

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500M R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 380

This course focuses on the principles of accounting, valuation, and the basic financial environment of close corporations and public companies.

### 508C Corporate Income Tax

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 501A or LAW 501B or LAW 501K R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. SA: DCL 465

Federal income tax of corporations and shareholders. Tax consequences of choice of entity. Tax aspects of S-Corporation.

# 508D Advanced Corporate Law

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 483

Corporate law topics with emphasis on issues raised by policy makers and scholars.

# 508F Corporate Governance and Compliance

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 592b Survey of issues in corporate governance and compliance.

# 508K International Corporate Governance

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Focus on the broadening scope of corporate stakeholders' involvement in the operations and performance of international companies.

#### 508M Corporate Law Colloquium

On Demand. 0 to 6 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: LAW 500M R: Open to Law students.

Student presentation of corporate law issues.

# 508N Corporate Law and Finance Seminar

On Demand. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 500M R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Exploration of complex issues in contemporary law with a focus on issues likely to arise in a sophisticated real-world corporate or transactional practice.

# 509A Analytical Methods for Lawyers -

### Microeconomics

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 607A

Condensed principles of microeconomics to serve as a primer to law students.

# 509B Analytical Methods for Lawyers - Statistics

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 607B Not open to students with credit in LAW 637E.

Condensed principles of statistics to serve as a primer to law students.

### 511C Employment Law

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 522 Not open to students with credit in LAW 511E.

Employment law covering federal legislation and related case law.

### 511D Labor Law

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 382 Not open to students with credit in LAW 511E.

Exploration of the application of the National Labor Relations Act.

# 511E Labor and Employment Law

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 511C or LAW 511D.

At-will employment relationship, terms and conditions of employment, and the application of the National Labor Relations Act as amended impacting collective bargaining units.

# 512B International Business Transactions

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 363

This course explores the legal aspects of international finance, and trade using Canadian-United States trade as an example.

# 512E International Trade Regulation

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 368 This course explores international trade regime.

### 512G Strategic International Transactions

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students in the MSU College of Law.

Strategic international business arrangements, including acquisitions, joint ventures, foreign direct investment, project finance, and international equity financing transactions.

# 512K International Commercial Arbitration

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500A and LAW 500B R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. Understanding of the international commercial arbi-

tration process and the role of national courts.

# 512M Japanese Legal System

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Overview of the structure of the Japanese legal system.

# 512N International Alternative Dispute Resolution

Summer. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Law and procedure of international alternative dispute resolution, with a focus on alternative dispute resolution in the European Union and its similarities with United States alternative dispute resolution law.

# 513 Franchise Law

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 343 A study of franchise relationships including the role of trademarks, statutory hallmarks, and remedy provisions.

### 514 Insurance Law

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 379

Address the history and function of a variety of types of insurance, issues regarding contract formation, insurance regulation, reinsurance, the insurance claims process, and/or defense and settlement of insurance claims.

### 515 Law and Economics

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 443

An application of economical theories examining formation, structure, process and the economical impact of law and legal institutions.

### 516 Mergers and Acquisitions

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500M R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 505

An overview of issues related to business transactions relating to mergers and acquisitions. This course will also consider the social and economic significance of mergers and acquisitions.

# 517A Mortgage Finance

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 466

Legal issues in the mortgage-banking industry with a focus on residential property.

# 519 Partnership Tax

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. P: (LAW 501A or LAW 501B or LAW 501K) and LAW 500M R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. SA: DCL 316

Tax issues associated with form, term, liquidation, transfer and class problems.

### 522 Products Liability

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 514

A study of the sources, development, and limitations of product liability.

### 524A Securities Litigation Seminar

Fall, Spring, Summer. 2 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500M R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 581

Exploration of securities law from the perspective of a litigation attorney.

### 524B Securities Regulation I

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500M R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 428

This course explores the regulation requirements applied to public offers of securities. Emphasis will be placed on the Security Act of 1933 and the Michigan Blue Sky law.

# 524C Current Issues in Securities Regulation

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500M R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 503.

Address current issues in securities regulation.

### 525 Torts II

Spring, Summer. 2 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500L R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 434

This course surveys specialized torts from workman's compensation to trademark infringement. Students will interview a client and complete a drafting assignment.

### 525B Topics in Tort Law

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 10 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: LAW 500R R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Controversies relating to the nature of tort law principles. Scope of liability for harm, causation, damages (e.g. inchoate and future loss) and tort reform.

### 530A Civil Procedure

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. SA: LAW 500A, LAW 500B

Survey of basic civil procedure, with primary emphasis on the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure and some discussion of state deviations from the federal model.

# 530B Contracts

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. SA: LAW 500D, LAW 500E

Basic law relating to the formation of a contract.

# 530C Lawyers and Ethics

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Introduction to the role of the lawyer in society; history and organization of the legal profession.

# 530D Research, Writing and Analysis

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. SA: LAW 500J

Fundamentals of non-electronic legal research and writing through the assignment of problems geared to develop analytical and problem-solving abilities.

### 530E Research, Writing and Analysis: Intellectual Property Perspective

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. SA: LAW 500V

Fundamentals of non-electronic legal research and writing through the assignment of problems geared to develop analytical and problem-solving abilities with a focus on trademark, copyright and patent law.

### 530F Contract Negotiation

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 530B R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 591C.

Introduction to the principles of negotiation through simulated exercises.

### 530G Regulatory State

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

How government agencies are structured, their authority, and how they carry out their mandates.

#### 530J Advocacy

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 4 credits. P: LAW 530D or LAW 530E or LAW 530N or LAW 530Q R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. SA: LAW 500K

Drafting an appellate brief and presenting a simulated oral argument.

## 530K Foundations of Law

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Introduction to the study of law.

### 530N Research, Writing and Analysis: Criminal Law Perspective

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 530D or LAW 530E.

Analysis and problem-solving through legal research and writing in a criminal litigation context.

#### 530P **Effective Legal Analysis and Process** Fall. 0 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Hands-on activities to help master critical skills.

#### 5300 Research, Writing and Analysis: Social Justice Perspectives

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 530D or LAW 530E or LAW 530N.

Written projects with a social justice focus.

# Introduction to Legal Analysis and Process 530R Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students.

Skill development of issue spotting, structuring answers, document drafting, time management, and essay exam taking.

#### 530S **Constitutional Law and the Regulatory State**

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 500C or I AW 530G

Constitutional, statutory, and administrative foundations of American government

#### **Advanced Civil Procedure** 530T

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 530A R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students

Augment the fundamentals taught in Civil Procedure.

#### 530U **First-Year Advanced Topics and Skills**

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Additional doctrinal depth in a required topic. Contains significant skills components.

#### Administrative Law 532

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 300 Not open to students with credit in LAW 810K.

The study of the administrative process and the delegation to administrative agencies of legislative power.

#### 533B Copyright Law

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 375 The history of copyright protect with an emphasis on entertainment law

#### 533C Internet Law

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 455 Not open to students with credit in LAW 535P.

Overview of areas where technology has challenged traditional legal doctrines and the way we practice law

#### International Intellectual Property 533E

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 526 An overview of copyrights, patents, trademark, and trade secrets under United States law.

### 533F

Licensing Intellectual Property Fall, Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 516

This course explores the management of an Intellectual Property portfolio to maximize a client's return on their investment in Intellectual Property assets.

#### 533G Media Law

Summer. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 301

This course focuses on free press/speech issues and the ethical and professional considerations of journalists

#### 533J **Patent Application Preparation**

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. P: (LAW 533K or concurrently) or (LAW 533V or concurrently) R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 556

Structure and methodology for preparing a universal patent application suitable for filing patents throughout the world.

#### 533K Patent Law

Fall, Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 564

An introduction to patent law and what is patentable.

#### 533N Trademark Law and Unfair Competition Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in

the MSU College of Law. This course addresses current issues and developments such as the constitutional foundations and limitations of trademark protection, domain names and

cybersquatting.

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 535 This course covers strategies and procedures pertaining to patent litigation in federal courts.

#### 533W **Topics in Property Law**

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 10 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. Current property issues and the public policy issues and underlying jurisprudence that surround them.

#### 535D Intellectual Property Survey

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 533V.

Survey of intellectual property law.

#### **Capstone Intellectual Property and** 535E Communications Law Seminar

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Presentation of scholars' works in progress involving intellectual property and communication law.

#### 535F Intellectual Property Practicum

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 535D or LAW 533J or LAW 533K R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students

Exposure to skills that intellectual property attorneys learn in practice.

#### 535K Topics in Cyberlaw from an International Perspective

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Rights and obligations regarding protections for formulas, recipes, and customer lists.

#### 535P Information Privacy and Security Law

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 533C

Regulation of information flow with particular attention to statutory and compliance issues.

#### 535Q **Digital Humanities**

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students

Legal and ethical issues implicated by the digital humanities research and resource-creation, including copyright, contract/licensing, privacy, and other issues.

#### 537D E-Discovery

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. Law, theory and practice of discovery of electronically stored documents and information.

# 537E Entrepreneurial Lawyering

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Technology and cloud-computing in building a law practice.

# 537J Lawyer Ethics and Regulation in a Technology-Driven World

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 500Q.

Obligations of lawyer's, both individually and as member's of the legal profession, in a technology-driven world.

# 537M Litigation: Data, Theory, Practice, Process

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Analyze data, decision theory, game theory, economic analysis, outcome predictions, to improve litigation strategies.

### 537N Legal Analytics

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 637E R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Extracting knowledge from data with specific applications to domains such as legal predictions.

### 537P Design Thinking for Legal Services

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Overview of phases of design thinking methodologies that address problems/challenges in business law.

# 537Q Delivering Legal Services

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Survey of legal service delivery processes.

### 537R Artificial Intelligence and Law

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. How Artificial Intelligence (AI) interacts with law. It

considers how lawyers, computer scientists and others can get law and code to work together to regulate interactions among people and computers.

# 537S Automated Vehicles and the Law

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Legal issues related to automated vehicles including product liability, cybersecurity, privacy, insurance, criminal law and procedure, federal and state regulation, and patents. How discovery and evidentiary presentation at trial may be managed.

# 537T Technology Transactions Skills

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students.

Laws affecting the structure, documentation and completion of technology transactions in contemporary transactional legal practice.

# 537U Evolutionary Analysis and Law

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Basic computer techniques analyzing legal texts to measure similarity, sentiment, and perhaps influence, incorporating into law practice. Elucidating the cultural evolution of the common law.

# 537V Blockchain Technology, Law, and Policy

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Blockchain technology, the laws affecting applications of the technology, and anticipated effects on contemporary legal practice.

# 540A Basic Will Drafting

Fall, Spring. 2 to 4 credits. P: LAW 501D R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 391

This course focuses on interviewing and drafting wills. The course also covers basic estate-planning vehicles for clients not subject to federal estate taxes.

### 540B Estate Planning and Drafting Seminar

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. P: (LAW 501A or LAW 501B) and (LAW 501D and LAW 500G) R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 482

The course focuses on federal estates, gifts, and generation-skipping transfer taxes. This is a hand-on course that requires students to draft wills and trusts.

# 540C Estates and Future Interests Drafting Seminar

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 491

This course focuses on estates and future interests and how they are used in property transfers. There will be several intensive in-class drafting assignment.

# 540D Estate and Gift Taxation

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 381 A study of a descendants' gross estate and the determination of appropriate deductions.

# 541A Child Advocacy

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 446

This course is designed to acquaint future attorneys and social workers with their roles and responsibilities in representing and advocating for children and family as they interact with state government.

### 541B Domestic Violence

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 427

An historical background of Domestic Violence. Focus will be placed on understanding the nature of domestic violence, the prevention of domestic violence, and the survivor and batterer behavior.

#### 541D Family Dissolution Law Reform Seminar

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. P: LAW 541E R: Not open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 312

This course explores the discourse of no-fault divorce law and the need to reform. Several proposals will be explored.

# 541E Family Law: Marriage and Divorce

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 504

The study of the substantive requirements of marriage, divorce, allocation of property, alimony, child custody, ante nuptial agreements, and separation agreements.

### 541F Family Law: Child, Family and the State

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 521

Legal issues confronting families including marriage, parenthood, balancing work, domestic violence, adoption, and artificial insemination.

# 541G Immigration Law

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 353 A survey of United States immigrant law. An emphasis will be placed on policy issues and on issues that an attorney may encounter.

# 541J Integrative Law and Social Work

Fall. 1 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 474 This course covers issues related to child abuse and neglect from a multi-disciplinary perspective.

### 541K Juvenile Law

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 378 A survey of laws related to juvenile courts. Topics

A survey of laws related to juvenile courts. Topics include juvenile delinquency, child neglect, jurisdiction, waivers, arrest, pretrial and trial.

### 541M Matrimonial Practice

Fall, Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 532

This course focuses on practical skills necessary to develop expertise in handling matrimonial matters from initial client contact through each step of the process.

# 541P Gender Power Law and Leadership

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Personal and organizational leadership, double binds facing women leaders, obstacles that have impeded women's advancement, analyze the ways in which leadership is conveyed in culture.

# 541Q Global Perspectives on Women in Law

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

History, employment trends, practices and demographics of women within all sectors of the legal profession in other nations.

# 541R Topics in Family Law

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of law students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Legally recognized family relationships and their members' rights and responsibility.

# 541S Seminar in Race, Law and American Culture: From Slavery to Post Civil Rights

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. History of race relations in the U.S., with primary reference to the culture and laws affecting African-Americans

### 541T Immigration Consequences of Criminal Activity Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Immigration consequences of criminal activity.

## 541U Refugee and Asylum Law Seminar

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Refugee and asylum law in the United States.

# 541V Perspectives on U.S. Immigration Law

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Immigration law and policy from a variety of perspectives, such as historical, social, public policy, economic, human rights, and legal perspectives.

### 541W Racial Justice - Legal and Societal Dimensions of Truth and Reconciliation

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students. Racial justice in America, and exploring processes of truth and reconciliation that can help bring about the goals of racial healing and transformation.

# 545C Constitutional Law of the European Union

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Introduction to the evolution of the European Communities and European Union.

# 545D Global Law Colloquium

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Contemporary international legal issues.

# 545E Global Perspective on Education Law

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

International, pan-national and national law regulating public elementary and secondary education.

# 545F Introduction to Islamic Law

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. Islamic legal philosophy and jurisprudential systems.

### 545J Political Systems and Human Rights in Central and Eastern Europe

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Political systems in countries where human rights are not respected.

### 545K Halal Food: Introduction of Islamic Laws and Ethics

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Religious foundations of Islamic dietary laws, ethics and customs relating to food generally.

### 545M International Law and Armed Conflict

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 548M.

Exploration of origins, purpose, content, development and impact of the laws of war in armed conflict.

### 545N Jewish Law

On Demand. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Comparative perspective of Jewish Law following in-

Comparative perspective of Jewish Law following introduction to sources and structure of areas found in both Jewish and American laws.

# 545P International Taxation and Tax Treaties

On Demand. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 501K or LAW 501A or LAW 501B R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Surveys U.S. taxation of U.S. and foreign persons engaged in international activities.

#### 548C European Union Law

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. SA: DCL 447 Not open to students with credit in LAW 579V.

An introduction to legal institutions of the European economy.

## 548E International Environmental Law

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law.

An introduction to the use of bilateral and multilateral realities and other international mechanisms.

### 548F International Human Rights

Fall. 1 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 418

This course explores human rights and the international legal order, background, concepts, and the future.

# 548G International Sale of Goods

Fall. 2 to 4 credits.

A study of international sale law under the United Nations Convention on contracts.

# 548K International Civil Litigation

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500A and LAW 500B R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 439 Not open to students with credit in LAW 805.

Overview of litigation of claims between private plaintiffs and defendants who reside in or are citizens of different countries and claims against foreign governments.

# 548M Laws of War

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 548

This course explores the origins, purpose, content, development and impact of the laws of war in light of the changing nature of armed conflict.

### 548N Public International Law

Fall, Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 341

A study of the International legal system, sources, and origins.

#### 548Q Transnational Legal Research

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 445

The course is designed to develop a student's skills in legal research, writing, and advocacy in transnational legal research.

# 548Z Topics in International Law

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 10 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. Special topics in international law.

### 549C Special Topics in Comparative Law

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 6 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students in the MSU College of Law.

Special topics in comparative law.

# 549D Topics in Comparative Constitutional Law

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500J and LAW 500K and LAW 500C R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Examination of approaches to free expression in a variety of democratic countries.

### 549E Topics in Comparative Law

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 10 credits in all enrollments for this course. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Special topics in comparative law.

# 549F Comparative Free Expression

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 549D.

Examination of approaches to free expression in a variety of different countries.

# 550 Conflict of Laws

Fall, Spring. 1 to 4 credits. P: LAW 530A R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 460 Not open to students with credit in LAW 550A.

Personal jurisdiction, choice of law, and the full faith and credit clause.

# 550A Topics in Conflict of Laws

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 10 credits in all enrollments for this course. P: LAW 530A R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students. Not open to students with credit in LAW 550.

Doctrine and policy considerations relevant to choiceof-law determinations. Simulated appellate litigation.

### 551B Constitutional Law Topics: Free Expression

Fall, Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 554

This course focuses on the theory and history of speech.

### 551C Public Law Colloquium

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 500C and LAW 530G R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Current issues in constitutional, administrative and regulatory law.

# 551D Government Relations and Lobbying Law

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Distinctions among legislative, administrative and grassroots lobbying and the professional norms of lobbyists.

# 551E Judicial Politics

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Practice of selecting and retaining judges in the American states and judicial decision making process.

# 551F Free Speech on Campus

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students. Free speech principles as they apply on the college campus and creating a program for others to learn more about the First Amendment.

# 552 Labor Law Seminar

Fall, Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 499

This course covers current issues in Labor law, collective bargaining, and labor management relations.

# 558B Food and Drug Law

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 357 This course provides a working knowledge of domes-

tic laws focuses on regulated foods, drugs, cosmetic, biologics/blood and medical devices.

### 558C Health Care Law

Fall, Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 458

This course surveys the major aspects of substantive health-care law and regulations.

# 558E Managed Care Seminar

Fall, Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 519

This course focuses on the legal aspects of health care as it relates to financing health care.

# 558J Health Care Fraud and Abuse

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 594

This course cover Federal and State laws that impose criminal and civil penalties on health coverage provisions.

### 558M Special Topics - Health Care Law

Fall, Spring, Summer. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students in the MSU College of Law.

Legal, medical, and ethical world of assisted reproductive technologies. Concepts of personhood, human reproduction and governmental intervention in reproductive decision making.

### 558N Seminar in Assisted Reproductive Technologies and the Law

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students in the MSU College of Law.

Legal, medical, and ethical issues surrounding assisted reproductive technologies.

#### 558S Biotechnology Law Seminar

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Explore the impacts of biotechnology on legal topics that include intellectual property, business, federal regulations, property, criminal law and evidence, bioethics and international law.

# 558U Health Care Organization, Reimbursement and Regulation

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Vehicles for providing health care in the U.S.

### 558Y Scientific Research Regulation

Spring of odd years. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Seminar will focus on the legal, ethical and regulatory issues surrounding scientific research.

### 565A Animal Law

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 501

A survey of animal legal issues including property status, zoning and cruelty.

# 565B Wildlife Law

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 376 This course explores the legal systems impact on wildlife.

### 565C Legal Issues with Energy Development and Wildlife

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Emerging issues in energy law and policy relating to fish and wildlife.

# 566A Environmental Law

Fall, Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 323

A broad-based study bringing elements of economics, ecology, politics, and philosophy.

### 566B Land Use Planning

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 401

This course covers methods of local government land use. Emphasis will be placed on theories and practices of zoning and eminent domain.

### 566C Natural Resource Law

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 463 This course explores legal regimes under which public national resources are allocated and managed.

### 566D Water Law

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 372 This course examines water rights under the riparian doctrine and the prior appropriation system.

# 566K Climate Change Law and Policy

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Overview of the scientific evidence in support of climate change and judiciary reaction. International law and policy developments. Explore U.S. efforts to address climate impacts. Assess regional, state and local responses to climate change.

### 566N Agricultural Law

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Regulatory framework of the food and agriculture sector at the federal, state and local levels.

#### 566P Urban Food, Farm and Agriculture Law Practicum

Facucum Foll Spring

Fall, Spring, Summer. 0 to 6 credits. P: (LAW 530D or LAW 530E or LAW 530N) and LAW 530J R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students.

Interrelationships that have an impact on urban agriculture and food markets.

# 566Q Regulating Environmental Risk

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Regulatory responses to environmental and other risks to human life and health.

# 566R Agriculture Special Topics: Pesticides, Fertilizer, and Conservation

On Demand. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to master of laws students.

Pesticide and fertilizers regulatory framework and conservation practices in the agriculture industry.

## 566S Environmental Justice

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

How environmental law and civil rights law can be used to address disparate environmental harms experienced by low-income communities and communities of color.

### 566T Marijuana Law

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. Historical and current legal developments at the state and federal levels relating to the regulation of marijuana.

### 572B State and Local Taxation

Fall, Spring, Summer. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 356

The course focuses on the requirements of uniformity and equality. The class also addresses other Constitutional limitations on state and local tax.

# 572D Tax Policy Seminar

Fall, Spring. 1 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 517

Tax policy issues arising from federal taxation.

# 572G Nonprofit and Tax-Exempt Organizations

Spring. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master of laws students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students.

Examination of the formation, governance, operation and the legal framework of non-profit, tax-exempt organizations.

# 579A Bill of Rights Seminar

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500C and LAW 500N R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 394

This course focuses on the legal and theoretical questions surrounding the Bill of Rights.

### 579B Civil Rights Seminar

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 317 The study of civil rights claims brought through Section 1983 and Bivens actions.

# 579C Constitutional Law Seminar

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 393

An in-depth study of various aspects of Constitutional Law.

# 579D Education Law

Fall, Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 456

An overview of the legal and history of the American education system, its Constitutional and statutory underpinnings and the tension between public and private, religious, and secular educational systems.

# 579E Election Law

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 318 A study of election issues.

#### 579F Equity

Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 333

This course focuses on the history of equity, equity jurisdiction, equitable remedies and contempt powers.

# 579G Federal Jurisdiction

Fall, Spring. 0 to 6 credits. P: LAW 530A R: Open to Law students or law advanced students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. SA: DCL 349

A study of the operation of the federal court system focusing on the Civil Rights Acts.

#### 579J Jurisprudence

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 385

A surveys of law and the legal process. This course explores the decision-making process and the social, political, and moral contexts that influence judicial decisions.

### 579K Law and Religion

Fall. 0 to 6 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non-degree students. SA: DCL 530

Church/state law with special attention placed on legal doctrines under the Establishment Clause and Free Exercise Clause of the 1st Amendment.

### 579M Legislative Drafting

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. R: Open to Law students or master's of law students or law lifelong students or law non degree students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 334

History and process of legislative drafting. Legislative procedure. Language, structure, and grammar of legislation.

# 579N State and Local Government Law

Fall, Spring. 2 to 4 credits. R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 354

# 593A Michigan Civil Procedure

A survey of Michigan civil procedure at the trial and appellate levels.

#### 593B Commercial Transactions Seminar

Fall. 2 to 4 credits. P: LAW 501C and LAW 501E R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 490

A study of commercial financing from the point-ofview of a practitioner.

### 593C Mortgages

Summer. 2 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500G R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 406

This course covers various aspects of the law of suretyship, real property security, land mortgages, land contracts, rights to rent and Article 9 of the Uniform Commercial Code.

#### 593D Remedies

Fall, Spring, Summer. 1 to 4 credits. P: LAW 500D R: Open to students in the MSU College of Law. SA: DCL 423

Overview of main types of remedies available in the American legal system following a determination of liability for violation of contract, tort, property or constitutional law. Covers monetary damages, equitable relief, and examines the implications of choosing particular remedies.
